

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THE OUTSIDE of the inn also gets special attention this season, particularly the walled, formal garden area where summer receptions are held. The gardens can be seen from the maining room's picture windows.

Even the old stage coach outside, with leather side curtains, wooden wheels and iron tires, and the wooden cradle in the second floor hall, get treated to ribbons and sprigs of holly for the holiday.

In the coach house, generally reserved for private parties, red ribbon is used profusely to brighten up the dark somber wooden posts and staid stained glass windows.
