Allowable annual income for applicants will range from \$4,728 for one
person to \$12,8600 for a family of four,
and to \$17,390 for six persons. Liquid
assets such as currency, savings or
checking accounts, stocks and bonds
will be limited to \$2,000 or less per
household, except when one member is
age 65 or over.

basic categories of applicants:
- The household which is out of, or

The household which is out of, or has indicated a need for, a deliverable heating fuel such as oil, coal, wood or

propane.

• The household which has an overdue (by at least 30 days) natural gas or electric bill. Payments for electricity are restricted to primary heat source cases, or bases where it is an essential component of the overall heating sys-

tem such as in forced-air furnaces.

Top payments will range from \$125 to \$200 each depending upon the household's income. In most cases, payment will be made directly to the fuel sup-

will be made directly to the fuel sup-plier.

Emergency energy assistance appli-cations are being handled by local DSS offices and Community Action Agency (CAA) offices throughout the state. At least one DSS office is located in every

least one DSS office is located in every Michigan county.
About \$22 million, or nearly one-fourth of the total federal energy grant, was set aside for the emergency, crisis-intervention component this year. MDSS, which administered last year's \$48 million Federal Energy Assistance Program in Michigan, is responsible for overall distribution of this year's aid.

The other two components of the LIEAP program begin Jan. 1 — a \$393. Imilion tax credit plan for low-income homeowners and renters, and a \$30 million "Supplemental Fuel Cost Payment" to qualifying tax credit, AFDC and GA recipients. The state Treasury Department will administer those two components.
