What to do? Remove and burn dead and dying trees. Keep trees healthy by watering, pruning and fertilizing. If you have a pine with symptoms, take a core wood sample, enclose it in a self-sealing plastic bag and send it to MSU Nematode Diagnostic Laboratory; Michigan State University, East Lansing 4862. Check the local MSU County Extension office for bulletin E-800, "Nematode Detection."
