Troy Athens girls falter

Linda Giordano won three events and tied for first place in the fourth to lead Royal Oak Donors past Troy Athens, 93-00-85-05, in girls' gymnastics Thursday.

Although it lost, Athens qualified for the regional tournament by finishing its fourth-straight meet with an over-85 score.
