Our wines out-perform the French champions

First, a couple of one-liners, apropos

of nothing special.

Favorite recent advertisement line

"Living well is the best revenge."

Favorite attitude — "Wine improves with age. The older I get, the more I enjoy it."

And the more I think about both of those, the more I enjoy them.

Reports of structured wine tastings aren't usually reported in this column, but there was an event late last fall that was so noteworthy it deserves some comment.

Under the auspices of a local group, the Winetasters, 10 prime and great wines based chiefly on the Cabernet Sauvignon and, to a lesser extent, the Merlot grapes were tasted.

Five Bordeaux wines from the great 1975 vintage were evaluated, followed by five 1974 Cabernet Sauvignons from California. Both were, of course, con-sidered the best vintage years from the decade of the 1970s.

Thirty-nine people participated in the tastings, which were done blind. The scoring employed a nine-point scale under optimal conditions.

The following results are given according to rank, service order and mean score: Stag's Leap Wine Cellars, cask 23, rank 1, service order 9, mean

score 7.66; Chaleau Petrus, rank 2, service order 5, mean score 7.55; Beaulieu de Latour, rank 3, service order 6, mean score 7.18; Sterling Reserve, rank 4, service order 10, mean score 7.00; Monday Reserve, rank 5, service order 8, mean score 6.95; Chateau Levice 7.00; Monday Reserve, rank 6, service order 1, mean score 6.82; Chateau Palmer, rank 7, service order 4, mean score 6.75; Chateau Latour, rank 8, service order 7, mean score 6.64; Heitz Martha's Vinyard, rank 9, service order 7, mean score 6.55; and Chateau Margaux, rank 10, service order 3, mean score 6.58.

There wasn't a weak wine in the group. Today, all are in the \$30.45 a bottle price range except for the \$20 Leoville and the above \$50 Petrus — hardly in the everyday fare range for any of us.

But the result are reported here for one important reason. It is frequently said that the California wine industry's greatest strength lies in its ability to produce high quality, everyday jug wines, and that the French surpass them in the world of great wines.

But here, once again, as has so frequently occured with this tasting group of Michiganians, the best of California out-performed some of the best France

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
