# Surviving wrestlers gird for regional

Farmington High's Dave Denny has been staying on top of things these days. And a lot of those "things' have been opposing wrestlers. Denny, a senior 112-pounder on Farmington's wrestling team, has won 32 of his 34 matches this season. Some 27 of his victories have come on pins. "He's aggressive and he's a pinner — he has a lot of first-period pins," said Farmington coach Don Detter, who'll accompany Dave and three other Falcon mattmen to the stade Class A regional Saturday at Ann Arbor Huron High.

The Farmington four advanced to regional competition by finishing in the top three in their respective weight classes in the district tournament last Saturday at Huron.

The other FHS survivors are Mark Denny, Dave's

younger brother, Bill Anglin and Jim Steiner.
North Farmington, which also wrestled in the Huron district, will be represented in the regional by junior Paul Cotter and senior Steve Magyari. Farmington Harrison, a Class S echool, will have two wrestlers, seniors Bob Cushing and Ken Kopko, in the regional at Dearborn Heights Robichaud Saturday.

If these wrestlers finish in the top two in their weight classes, they'll advance to the state finals Feb. 27-28. This year the finals in all four classes will be held in the University of Michigan's Crisler Arena.

FARMINGTON'S DAVE Denny won the 112-pound district title with a 10-4 decision over Walter Young of Belleville. Brother Mark won the 132-pound crown, pining Belleville's Kerry O'Keefe in


districts. He placed second in the 167 month class, slosing to Sleve Szelagi of Plymouth Sales 1-0, in the finals. Steiner and Szelagi split during the regular season and will probably meet again in the regional.

Anglin, a junior, finished second at 126 pounds, finally falling to James Kohn of Jackson High by a socre of 6-0. Anglin, no 14-36, decisioned a togol opponent in Belleville's Fred Vera earlier in the district.

"Anglin and Mark Denny were big surprises,"
Detter said. "They were really hot during the district. They wrestled real well."

Farmington led by a point (35-34) at halftime, but Harrison came back to score 15 third-quarter points to the Falcons' 11. The winners dominated the fourth quarter, 23-14.

Harrison, now 11-5 overall, is home to Plymouth Canton at 8 p.m. on Thursday. Farmington, now 9-9, travels to Pontiac Northern on Friday.
