Hills canine expert appears at Kennel Show

Everything you ever wanted to know about dogs (but didn't know who to ask) can be learned from Barbara Zimmerman of Farmington on Sunday, March 8, at Cobo Hall. She will be among nine canine experts participating in the Information Center at the Detroit Kennel Club 53rd Annual All-Breed Bench Dog Show.
"The purpose of the Information Center is to educate the public about the different breeds of dogs," says Julia Gasow, Detroit Kennel Club president. "The experts will answer questions about the care, feeding and training of dogs, as well as suggest the right 'dog for a family or individual.'"

Zimmerman has been raising and showing collies, Shih Tzus, Briards and whippets for 25 years. She was an all-breed handler, which involves training, grooming and showing dogs, before becoming a dog show judge three years ago. She occasionally speaks on dog show judging to various clubs in the Detroit area.
She is a member of the Collie Club of America, the Briard Club of America and the Progressive Dog Club.
Other experts chosen by the Detroit Kennel Club to participate in the Information Center are Ronald Pemberton

and Sylvia Howison, Howell; John Connolly, Dearborn; Betty Barker, Sterling Heights; Ray Ferso, Royal Oak; Dorothy Tucker and Toni Gorman, Woodhaven; and Maggie Hilliard, Wyandotte.
