PLAYING SAFE
 In this position, white roils a 5-5.
What is your recommended move?
 Most people probably would move all three checkers from the 12 point to the 6, and the 9 point blot to the 4. This play is certainly safe and sound, but hardly excites the intellect. White shouldn't be in such a burry to "safely" get home. There could be difficulty on the next roil or two that would result in awkward positioning.


A much more diversified play is to move one checker from the 12 to the 8 point, one checker from the 9 to the 4 point and two checkers from the 6 to the 1 point. This move is much stronger

than the previous possibility.
White has closed the 1 point and has created the same three builders needed to land on black or close the 3 point.
With this play, black will certainly flee for his life if he rolls a 5-2, 5-3, 5-4, 5-5

or 1-6.

Since black does not have a strong home board, white should play for strong position. With the doubling cube "neutral" (in the middle), white could easily force black out before his next roll.

The films of director Michelangelo Antonioni rarely subscribe to the standard rules of narration and plot, "Blow Up" (1986) and "The Passenger" (1973) have basic plot lines, but both place greater emphasics on people reacting to interpersonal conflicts than on the telling of a coherent story. 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
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
