

Fr. Cain Marks 25 Years As Priest

Fr. Thomas J. Cain, pastor of St. Maurice Catholic Church of Livonia, will observe the 25th anniversary of his ordination as a priest Sunday, Feb. 22.

The Jubilee Mass will begin at 12 noon in St. Maurice Church on Lyndon just east of Farmington Road.

A DINNER, hosted by the church's altar society, will follow the mass in Livonia's Roma Hall. More than 800 guests are expected to attend.

Fr. Cain was ordained Feb. 24, 1945 by Edward Cardinal Mooney. He studied at Sacred Heart Seminary in Detroit and St. Mary Seminary in Norwood, Ohio.

He was named the founding pastor of St. Maurice parish in 1960. When the parish was first formed there were 150 families registered. Today the parish census numbers 1,250 families.

ST. MAURICE Church was dedicated Aug. 15, 1961 and the parish school opened in the fall of 1965. The first graduating class from the school was in June 1969.

Prior to serving at the Livonia parish, Dr. Cain was an

William Barclay has written, "In many ways tolerance is a lost virtue, and where it does exist, it exists from the wrong cause."

True tolerance springs only from mighty conviction. It means little for a person who stands for nothing to let ever-

one else do as he pleases. Of course the person who stands for nothing may fall for anything. When a person truly believes in essential values gives others the equal right to have their values and desires only their welfare, that is tolerance.

John Wesley, a mighty evangelist and great Christian leader and founder of Methodism said, "The thing which I resolved to use every possible method of preventing was a narrowness of spirit, a party-spirit (being straitened in our own bowels) - that miserable bigotry which makes many an unready to believe that there is any work of God but among themselves."

Rev. Lester Kinsolving's Religion Update Bernard Cardinal Alfrink and his fellow Dutch Catholic bishops appear to have been successful - thus far - in their attempt to persuade the Pope of Paul over the issue of priestly celibacy.

THE PROBLEM is indeed urgent. Throughout the world, marriages of clergy and nuns are becoming so frequent as to be regarded as newsworthy if they involve monsignors, bishops or college presidents like Sister Jacqueline Grennan.

A later exchange between the Pope and the Dutch bishops did little to change the opposing positions. Pope Paul did say he was willing to consider the ordination of an extremely limited number of elderly married men, and he did state in effect that discussion between the Vatican and the Dutch Bishops might be beneficial, but only if "bishops, priests and all members of the Dutch Catholic community...revise their thinking."

IF NOTHING comes of this and Pope Paul tries to unseat Cardinal Alfrink, he may well be told by the majority of Dutch Catholics, not to mention a number of powerful members in the Latin Church, that since there are undoubtedly a number of problems in his own archdiocese (Rome) he might more appropriately tend to

WHATEVER the reason for maintaining compulsory priestly celibacy, it appears now to be more than offset by the cost of revolution - particularly in the possibility of losing an entire country whose Catholic Church is becoming far more Dutch than Roman.
