


Harrison's Dale Sklar leans into U of D High's Ray Lee. (Staff photos by Randy Borst)

## North Farmington axed

Forget any upset in this district championship. The Cinderella team from North Farmington just couldn't keep up with run-and gun Southfield. The host Blue Jays won their second straight district basketball title, 59-48, Friday night.

The Raiders, who upset Detroit Henry Ford by one point (15-44) to reach the district final, couldn't compete with Southfield's overall depth and quickness.

North Farmington trailed by only two points, 8-6, after the first quarter, but Southfield raced to a 21-point second quarter to take a commanding 29-20 halftime advantage.

"I think the pace really got to them," said Southfield coach Greg Sliwka. "We kept substituting, and the ball was really moving up and down the court. They (North Farmington) primarily use only six players."

THE VICTORY raises Southfield's overall record to 15-7. The Blue Jays now advance to the Southfield-Latrup Regional where they meet Observer & Eccentric's No. 1-ranked team, Birmingham Brother Rice, at 7:39 p.m. tomorrow. Southfield is ranked fourth by the O & E.

Rice advances to regional competition after win-ning the Birmingham Groves District Friday night. The Warriors held off the slowdown tactics of West Bloomfield to win the title, 24-13.

But Sliwka promises no low scoring or slow-downs against Rice tomorrow night. Southfield will rely on depth, transition play and speed in its attempt to upset the mighty Warriors. And the Blue Jays will be ready for this matchup.

They want revenge from last year's setback to Rice in the regional championship at Lathrup.
