

Baron tankers win

In a battle of area swim powers, Birmingham Seaholm upset Bloomfield Hills Andover to win the Southeastern Michigan Association league meet title Friday night at the Baron's pool.

Andover beat Seaholm in regular-season, dual-meet action.

The Maples tallied 375 points while the Barons collected 312.

Royal Oak Kimball took the third spot (157) followed by Southfield (114); Berkley (105); Troy (51); Ferndale (35) and Hazel Park (20).

Seaholm set a league and pool record in the 200-yard medley relay as Kip Kimble, Keith Gardner, Jeff Lundy and Mike Hanahan clocked a 1:41.0.

Lundy also set a league record in the 100-yard butterfly (54.58).

Andover's Mike Wanstuck shattered the league diving record with a 544.65-point performance.

Southfield, which surprised many observers with its strong fourth-place finish, was led by double-winner Ralf Brookes who took first in the 200-yard individual medley (2:01.5) and in the 300-yard freestyle (4:31.9).

Maple Mark Holsington captured first place in the 200-yard freestyle (1:48.5). Guy DeFranco claimed first place for Andover in the 100-yard freestyle (2:26) and teammate Scott Hammond took the honors in the 100-yard freestyle (4:09).

Gardner grabbed first place in the 100-yard breaststroke (1:02.2) for Seaholm while teammates Manuel Bar-Josh, John Spung, Al Kovach and Mark Holsington clocked a first-place 3:32.2 in the 400-yard freestyle relay.

IN THE CATHOLIC LEAGUE swim meet, Kurt Maczel and Robert Mackle of Birmingham Brother Rice and Detroit Catholic Central's Frank Sugrue and Matt Cashin each shattered league records in action at Oakland Community College last weekend.

CC claimed the Catholic League title with 415 points, while runners-up Rice ranked up 386.

University of Detroit High finished third with 149 points.

Dearborn St. Alphonsus took fourth (50) followed by Detroit DeLaSalle (33); Harper Woods Notre Dame (28) and Royal Oak Shrine (2).

Maczel erased the 100-yard backstroke record with a 58.9 clocking while teammate Mackle set a mark in the 500-yard freestyle in 4:47.2.

Cashin's league record came compliments of a 2:02.4 200-yard individual medley. Sugrue broke the 50-yard freestyle mark with a 22.7 clocking. He swam a 22.5 in preliminary competition.

CC double-winner Pete Klebba grabbed the 200-yard freestyle (1:47.2) and the 100-yard freestyle (49.4).

Shamrocks Mike Schultz, Cashin, Brian Hurley and Mark Mistevech took honors in the 200-yard medley relay (1:42.9).

Rice's Ray Peck finished first in diving competition with 332.6 points.

In the 100-yard butterfly, CC's Hurley won (55.2).

UD's John Ellis took first place in the 100-yard breaststroke (1:03.1).

Warriors Kevin McJannet, Mackle, Dixon Kane and Richard Kramer won the 400-yard freestyle medley (3:18.3).

Eaglets advance to regional final

Pity poor Ida! OLSM romps

The team on the court was Ida, but Orchard Lake St. Mary's basketball players surely were thinking about Hamtramck, their probable next opponent in the state Class C regional at Dundee High School.

Looking ahead like that has been the downfall of many a good high school basketball team, but it was right in this case — as long as the opponent was a team like Ida.

In a state tournament mismatch, coach Bob Shoemaker's St. Mary's club battered Ida, 68-39, before about 2,000 fans at Dundee last Tuesday.

In winning, St. Mary's raised its record to 19-3 and advanced to the regional final tomorrow to face the winner of last Wednesday's Ham-

tramck-Flat Rock game. Hamtramck, the Metro Conference champion, is favored to make the regional final.

The two Class C powers played back on Jan. 20 and St. Mary's slipped past Hamtramck by one point, 70-69.

Against Ida, St. Mary's ripped off 20-straight points before the hapless Blue Streaks finally made the scoreboard with 3:05 left in the first quarter. Hiram Harris, St. Mary's 6-foot-5 guard, scored 10 of game-high 19 points during that stretch.

HARRIS, IN FACT, sank three baskets in the first 43 seconds of play. Ed Okuniewski, another St. Mary's starter, followed with 18 points. OLSM's third

string was in by midway through the third quarter, and nine Eaglets made the scoring column.

Mike Duffey scored eight points, and Fred Polenz and Mike Knabusch each had six for Ida, which closed out an 18-5 season. Ida earned its regional licking by winning its first district championship in 15 years last week.

St. Mary's shot 43 percent from the field, making 28 of 68 attempts. Ida was cold from the floor, hitting just 14 of 57 attempts for 24 percent. The Blue Streaks made two of 17 in that disastrous first quarter.

The Eaglets dominated the boards, 48-24. Okuniewski, the team's 6-7 center, pulled down 12 rebounds, Chris Sass grabbed eight and Harris had seven.

Dingens and Jokisch each scored nine points in the first half and Shasky added eight to stake Rice to a its 10-point halftime margin. The Warriors led 18-8 after the first quarter.

"They (Rice) are so big," Siwka said. "The kids just didn't quite expect it — their size intimidated us so much."

And Siwka equally was impressed

with Rice's quickness — especially in the third quarter when the Warriors refused to slow things down.

"I give them (Rice) all the credit for running the ball up and down the court with us," The Southfield coach said.

ALTHOUGH RICE COACH Bill Norton uncharacteristically switched to the zone defense late in the game, he

said he wasn't concerned about controlling the tempo of the game.

"We not big on controlling tempo with this team as we've been in the past two years," Norton said. "We look for the holes (in the opponent's attack) and go after it. But we let down (in the third quarter)."

CITY OF FARMINGTON

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

MARCH 2, 1981

A Regular Meeting of the Farmington City Council was held on March 2, 1981 in the Council Chambers, 23600 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan, at 8:00 p.m.

PRESENT: Mayor Hartsock, Councilmen Bennett, Mitchell.

ABSENT: Councilmen Tupper and Yoder.

CITY OFFICIALS PRESENT: Mr. Dadman, Dir. Billing, Dir. Seifert, Attorney Kelly and City Clerk Viane.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

The minutes of other boards were received and filed.

Provisions of the Nonconforming Uses and Fire Limits sections of the Zoning Ordinance were referred to the Planning Commission for further study and recommendations.

A sign variance was granted to Mr. Frank X. Cahill, 3244 Grand River, for a period of three months at which time the sign must be brought into conformance with the sign ordinance.

Letter of resignation from the Historical Commission was received from Mr. V.O. Bates.

Councilman William S. Mitchell was appointed to serve as city representative to the Oakland County Transportation Systems Management Committee.

The following Proclamations were issued:

DeMolay Week March 15-21, 1981

Ordinance No. C-675-81 which would amend the Public Safety Officer Employment Standards was introduced.

The proposal from ADT for the installation of an intrusion and fire alarm system for the Warner Massion was accepted.

The matter of city participation in legal proceedings involving the appeal to the Michigan Tax Tribunal by Xerox Corporation was tabled.

City Attorney Kelly was authorized to cooperate with Oakland County in the pending sewer litigation between Oakland County Drain Commissioner and the City of Detroit, and the City Manager was instructed to investigate the legal costs for Farmington to participate.

A Resolution was adopted which establishes increased wholesale water rates to Oakland County, effective December 1, 1980.

Public Comments were heard.

The financial report for the General Fund 7 months ended January 31, 1981 was received and filed.

The Public Safety Department Annual Operations Report for 1980 was received and filed.

Council established a Study Session to review the city's long range plans and to develop long term program priorities.

Mrs. Nancy Leonard, 33309 Shawwassee, and Mr. Charles Carvell, 33906 State Street, were appointed to the Farmington Historical Commission for another three year term.

The monthly bills were approved for payment.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:00 p.m.
