Special tax provisions help when selling house

If you are like most Americans, your home probably constitutes your largest single asset. But beware, the sale of that home could result in your largest

that home could result in your largest single tax bill. Fortunately, Congress has made spe-cial provisions for certain taxpayers who sell homes. For others, certain steps can help cut taxes. Generally, the sale of a home results in a taxable gain measured by the dif-ference between the proceeds received

when the sale, net of selling expenses and 'he owner's cost basis — the price you paid for it.

A special rule allows a taxpayer who sells a bome and buys another within 18 months before or after the sale, to postpone payment of the tax on the sale at least until the second home is sold.

This rule applies only when the cost of the new home exceeds the sales price of the old home. The rule does not apply to summer or vacation homes.

THE FIRST \$100,000 of gain on the

sale of the home can escape tax entireby if you or your spouse are older than
5 of the time of the sale. The home
sold must have been your residence for
at least three years prior to sale.
The \$100,000 exclusion may be used
only once during your lifetime.
Even those who do not qualify for
these special rules can save taxes on
the sale of a home.
Careful recordkeeping of the cost of
all improvements made on a home during the period of ownership can save
taxes. These improvement increase the
cost basis of the home, thereby
decreasing the taxable gain.
Examples of improvements which

Examples of improvements which you should be recording are room additions, interior remodeling and new appliances and fixtures to be sold with the house.

MORE MONEY went into mortgages in the Detroit metropolitan area in 1980 than in any year in history, but little of it helped home buyers and sellers. The total was \$8,684,19,937, surpassing the previous record of \$8,759,15,535 set in 1979. The home buyers-sellers market recorded only \$2,061,381,846 of that total, the smallest amount since post-recession 1976, according to the Lawyers Title Insurance Corp. The record remaining \$4,6 billion in clied Leavers Title Insurance Corp. The record remaining \$4,6 billion in ceffected more than \$1,5 billion in a Comparison of the Corp. financing and more than \$1,5 billion in a group of area hospitals. These amounts were supplemented by some \$2.1 billion in commercial-size (2800,000 and up) loans. The annual summary of activity is for Wayne, Oakland, Macomb and Washtenaw counties.

LIBERTY STATE Bank & Trust reported record earnings for 1980 with net income at \$2,024,770 or \$1.82 per common share. Assets were \$139,720,413, up \$20,251,989 from year end 1979.
