People in the padded rooms may have a few personal problems, but there's always somebody around who even they think is crazy.

To instance, while dry-landers, indy think all fishermen are deranged, many fishermen think steetheaders are. These thoughts came to mind as we received the announcement from ithe Metro-West Steelheaders of their free clinic this Sunday.

AN ANADROMOUS form of rainbow trout, steelhead sometimes begin life in spawning streams, although more often it's in DNR tanks. Either way, the fish sooner or later spend some growing time in a stream before migrating out to the Great Lakes.

Once they settle in the big water amid the alewives, the smelt and the smaller cousins, steelhead enjoy a few years of blissful, gournet excess. They also grow, sometimes to trophy size—the state record steelhead is 26½ pounds.

At 3 — usually — the surviving fish return to the original stream. Most often the fish do this because they're ready to spawn and die, but some fish survive the run and return.

Although spawning takes place in spring, some fish begin running upstream as early as the preceding September. That means there's both a spring spawning run and a smaller fall run.

Steelhead are never easy to catch, but they're even harder during the run. Maybe it's because they're imad with desire, maybe because they re will amaybe because them writtes, but once in they're eyen sharder during the run. They're especially reductant to strike the wet fly, lure or netting sack of salmon eggs usually used to entire them.

Among the more interesting items on tap are demonstrations in fileting and smoking fish, with samples given away.


