
### Farmington grad turns eye to searching for subs

At sea, Poertner is on call 24 hours a day. If anything goes wrong with the equipment it's his responsibility to fix it — anyttime of the day or night. Poertner said he enjoys the challenges of his job. "My biggest challenge is becoming familiar with the Kinkaid's communications equipment," he said. "We have over 300 pieces of equipment, and it's impossible to learn each piece overnight. It takes time to learn how to do he job well."

Although monitoring the Kinkaid's electronic equipment is not an easy

Although monitoring the Kinkaid's electronic equipment is not an easy task, Poertner finds it rewarding. "I enjoy my job because I feel like I'm doing soniething worthwhile," he said. "Also, my job plays an important role in the ship's ability to carry out her mission."
