**CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS CITY COUNCIL MEETING APRIL 13, 1981**  
 The City Council of the City of Farmington Hills held a regular meeting April 13, 1981. Mayor Wolf opened the meeting at 7:30 p.m. Members present were Barwell, Soronen, Oppertbauer, Wolf, Alkateeh, Lange and Dolan. Others present were City Attorney, City Clerk, Carolee, City Auditor, Billson, and City Manager.  
 Council approved the minutes of March 9 and March 23, 1981.  
 Council approved Cable Television Franchising Ordinance and request for proposals preliminary to bidding as outlined in document titled Request for Proposal for the cities of Farmington, Farmington Hills and Novi dated 3/6/81 prepared by C.T.I.C. Associates.  
 A Public Hearing was held on the revision of the Economic Development Corporation Project Plan for Hunter's Square Project with no action taken and tabled until April 27, 1981.  
 Public Hearing was held on the revised Economic Development Corporation Project Plan for Ronson Company (Office Building) and action was postponed until the next regular meeting, April 27, 1981.  
 Council enacted Amending Ordinance C-6-81, Chapter 5, Section 5.170 of the Special Assessment Ordinance to increase maximum on interest rates and approved the summary for publication.  
 City Attorney was directed to prepare an Ordinance with option to provide covenants solely for elderly and handicapped to Metropolitan Detroit Baptist Manor Inc. for construction of Housing for Senior Citizens and handicapped on city property located at Freedom and Drake Roads.  
 Council approved the removal of temporary barriers placed on Bond and Firwood Streets between Orchard Lake Road and Eastfield.  
 Staff was directed to make a study of street signs for the area.  
 Bonding resolutions for Erie Hill Paving and Lincolnshire Paving were approved increasing the interest rates to permit the sale of bonds.  
 Request by the Finnish Church Association was approved to hold the Annual Ethnic Festival on May 23, 24 and 25, 1981 on their property at 35200 Eight Mile Road.  
 Approval was given the Finnish Center Association to hold an out-door Wienie Roast with dancing indoors on August 15, 1981.  
 Attorney Bibeau was directed to draft an Ordinance re: the sale of 72 acres of City property located adjacent to the Northside of 4299 on Middlebelt Road.  
 Public Hearing was set for the vacation of a portion of Valley Street between Northwestern Highway and Old Colony Roads.  
 Council approved the resolution requesting a permit from the State of Michigan Department of Transportation to close Grand River Avenue to accommodate the Veterans Memorial Day Services and Parade on May 25, 1981, between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m.  
 Council to adjourn to Executive Session after the meeting regarding pending litigation.  
 Approval was given for an extension of time for the final approval of the Preliminary Plat of Margiotta Subdivision in Section 33, to February 27, 1983.  
 Sanitation street improvement special assessment districts were established for Old Homestead, Franklin Knolls, Springland, LaTuerna and Halted Road north of Eight Mile Road, setting the Necessity Hearing for May 4, 1981, and the re of Intent to Issue Bonds was adopted for each district.  
 Special Assessment District was established and Necessity Hearing set for May 4, 1981 for a seal and stone chip surface for Franklin Fairway Street in Section 1.  
 Upon the recommendation of the City Manager, Council accepted the low bid submitted by Telford and Decker for the purchase of 189 annual supply of gutter blades in the amount of \$11,688; and accepted the low bid of St. Regis Culverters for purchase of the annual supply of culverts and accessories in the amount of \$5,275.14.
