# Farmington lands 7th in girls' track meet

**CITY COUNCIL MEETING**  
**MAY 11, 1981**

Farmington Hills City Council held a regular meeting May 11, 1981. Mayor Wolf opened the meeting at 7:30 p.m. Members present were Burwell, Soronen, Oppenheimer, Wolf, Alkateeb, Dolan and Lange. Others present were City Manager Savage, Assistant City Manager Costick, City Clerk Cairns and City Attorney Bibeau. A plaque designating Fire Station No. 4 as Button's Station was presented to Paul Button.

Council approved the Council minutes of April 20 and April 27, 1981. Council endorsed the Oakland County Road Commission's "Share A Ride and Save" campaign and encourages Oakland County individuals and employers to participate. Council supported the resolution in opposition to Senate Bill 182.

June 1, 1981 was set for the hearing for water improvement on Rock Ridge. Council enacted Ordinance G-7-81 granting option to Detroit Baptist Manor to purchase from the City five acres of City owned property located at Freedom and Drake Roads.

Council ratified and confirmed the publication of the Notice of Intention to issue Bonds for Special Assessment Districts C138, 139, 140, 107, 114, 145, 147, 151, 143, 146, 148, 150 and 152.

Council will grant 50 per cent tax abatement for twelve years to Ingersoll-Rand when formally applied for under 1981.

May 26, 1981 was set for the Cost Hearing for Springfield and LaMuera road improvement special assessment districts.

Notice re Annual Convention of Michigan Municipal League, Plaza Hotel, Detroit, September 9-11, 1981 was received and filed.

Approval was given the request of developer of Country Stream Subdivision in Section 24 for an extension of time for their completion date from June 30, 1981 to June 30, 1983.

Renewal of three year refuse collection and disposal contract with The Rubbish Co., Inc. was approved.

Council appointed Savage term to '84, Cairns term to '83 and Rosch term to '82 to the Hospital Finance Authority pursuant to Act 38, Public Acts of 1959, as amended, and the resolution adopting the proposed Articles of Incorporation was approved.

Council approved the hiring of temporary employee to Parks and Recreation Dept. who is related to a full time employee of the City.

Public Hearing on City Budget to be held prior to final adoption scheduled for June 1, 1981.

Council waived bidding requirement to purchase three portable Motorola radios at a price of \$4,086.

Upon motion meeting adjourned.

5. Raise sales tax from 4% to 5.5%. Raise must be returned to local governments and schools.
6. Lot forms and fees to be assessed at one value.
7. Give state lottery profits to school aid fund.
