

Memorial parade salutes Marines

The 1981 Farmington/Farmington Hills Memorial Day Parade sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion will get underway at 10 a.m. on May 25.

It will start at the intersection of Orchard Lake and Grand River and terminate at the War Memorial Monument at Grand River and Farmington Road.

The U.S. Marine Corps is being honored this year although other services will be participating in the parade.

Awards will be presented to the outstanding enlisted Marine reservist and

the outstanding enlisted Marine regular.

Col. Norman J. Smith and Lt. Col. Richard D. Hughes of the 1st Battalion, 24th Marines will be the principal speakers at the conclusion of the parade.

Chairman of the 1981 parade committee is Lt. Col. Fred Collet of the VFW Post 2259 in Farmington.

His co-chairman is Walter Christensen of the American Legion Post 346 in Farmington and Raymond Heidenbrand of the Northwest Post

190, the American Legion in Farmington Hills.

IN ADDITION to the awards for the outstanding Marines of the year, 12 other Memorial Awards will be presented for the best marching units, the best floats, the best band, the best decorated bikes and numerous other categories.

The three veterans organizations and their auxiliaries represent more than 1,000 veterans in this area. Joining with these units in the parade will be

World War I veterans, Gold Star mothers and Blue Star mothers.

National and state dignitaries of the veterans' organizations will be in attendance as well as Farmington-area officials.

Group floats, marching units, musical and youth organizations are invited to participate.

Honor society names member

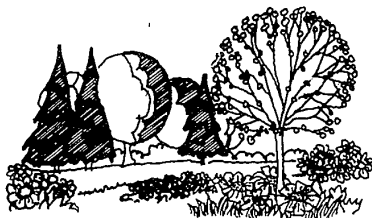
