THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

8.25 Weather Emergencies. No person shall park or allow to remain parked any vehicle on any portion of any street within any areafgl designated within the City of Farmington during a weather emergency, or park or allow to remain parked any vehicle in violatino of any parking restriction instituted as part of a declared weather emergency as provided herein. The registered owner of any such vehicle shall be responsible for cost of removal and subject to the penalties provided herein.
