## County Writing History Book

The Oakland County Sequi-Centennial Book of History, to contain about 300,000 words, some 600 illustrations of documents, people and places, including full-color reproductions of art and photography is now gaining momentum for a crash production schedule.

PLAN OF publication committee is to enlist support of reporters, writers, historians, and public relations specialists to undertake assignments covering all phases of up-dated Oakland County history. Photographers and layout artists will be brought into the program.

Historians, newsmen, and free lance writers are being enlisted to prepare features pertaining to the settlement and organization of each of 24 townships, 26 cities, and 38 villages of Oakland County. An average of four pages (2,500 words and pictures) will be devoted to these 87 subdivisions of government.

Public relations authorities will be asked to write features on various branches of county government, schools, churches, communications, arts and sciences, public utilities, parks and recreation, architecture, engineering, aviation, transportation, automotive, industrial developments, marketing and other features of history that have occurred since the turn of the century.

TWO VOLUMES of the Oakland County Book of History will be published, one a deluxe hard-cover book for libraries, schools and as a collector's item, the second will be published as a paper-back, complete with institutional-historic theme advertising. The deluxe edition will carry only the names of advertising sponsors.

## MACLD Meets March 11

The Farmington Chapter of the Michigan Association for Children with Learning Disabilities will meet at 8 p.m. March 11, in East Junior High School, 25000 Middle Belt, Farmington.

Dr. Virginia Svagr, director of the Reading Clinic for Oakland Schools, will discuss the problems of secondary school students with learning disabilities. Her topic will be "Is a Learning Disability Real?"

Dr. Svagr completed the requirements for a Ph.D. degree in education and clinical psychology at Wayne State University in 1965 and subsequently joined the Oakland School staff as a clinical psychologist.

She has assisted in the development of tests to evaluate the maturity level of children's perceptual motor skills and remedial reading and has at several leading universities in the Detroit area and on television Channel 56.

Dr. Svagr is also co-author of "Relationship of Perceptual and Visual Skills with Reading Accuracy and Comprehension" published in the Journal of the American Optometric Association, July, 1966.

## Baker Pushes Pollution Bill

LANSING Michigan industries that cannot afford to install pollution-control devices would receive assistance at no cost to the taxpayer under the provisions of a new bill introduced in the State House of Representatives.

CO-SPONSORED BY Representatives Raymond L. Baker (R-Farmington) and William P. Hampton (R-Bloomfield Hills), the proposed measure would establish a Michigan Environmental Development Authority to issue bonds and make long-term, low-interest loans from the proceeds to firms that would otherwise be unable to meet the expense of obeying compliance orders concerning air and water pollution.

"I have no sympathy," Baker stated, "for any industrial or mining concern that runs a high profit or under-takes a costly expansion program while ignoring its responsibilities in the area of pollution control."

"But there are cases where firms simply cannot obtain, through corporate loans or in any other manner, the price of needed pollution-control facilities."

"For example, it is simple enough for the state to order a small pulp mill to stop polluting a certain river; but the cost of an effective treatment plant may be nearly as much as the worth of the mill itself."

"In such instances, a firm has two choices: to shut down operations or move to a state where pollution laws are less strictly enforced."

"Either choice means a loss of jobs for a state economy that must provide an increasing number of jobs each year."

"THE NEW AUTHORITY will provide the means for such firms to stay in business and still meet their responsibilities for the protection and preservation of our environment," Baker added.

Hampton, who is a candidate for the Republican nomination for lieutenant-governor this year, pointed out that the new bill is basically a proposal for fighting industrial pollution through the same method most states have used for attracting industry.

"About a decade ago," Hampton pointed out, "the various states were competing vigorously to attract industry with tax-exempt bonds, industrial development corporations, and other inducements."

"Now it seems only fitting to me that we make use of the same means to enable industry to install anti-pollution facilities in cases where private financial resources are clearly unavailable."
