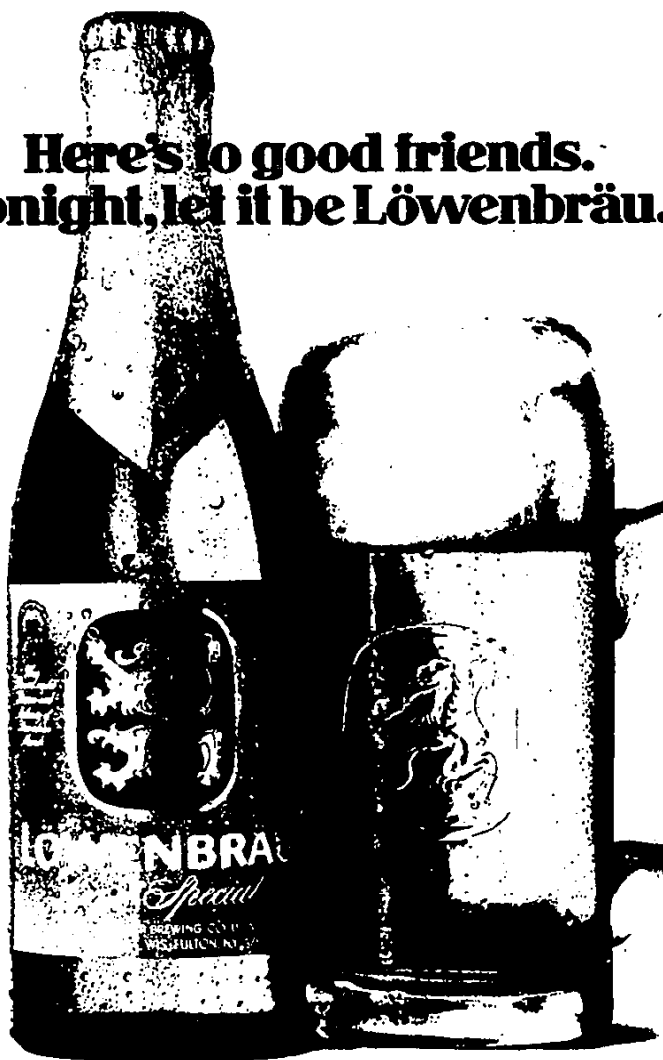

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Early days

Shortly after the establishment of Oakland Hills Country Club in July 1918, newly crowned U.S. Open champion Walter Hagen took the helm as club pro. The Miller farmhouse became his clubhouse, and the former chicken coop served as his pro shop. The farmland turned golf course drew acclaim from day one. Donald Ross, the foremost golf course architect of his day, had designed what is now considered one of the top 10 courses in the country.



11 years ago

By 1970, several colorful chapters had been written into OHCC history. After the present clubhouse was completed and opened in 1922 (replete with accommodations for overnight guests), the club hosted the Western Open — the first of many major tournaments played at OHCC. In 1924, the U.S. Open visited Oakland Hills for the first time. OHCC's fifth U.S. Open arrives in 1985.



Today

Judging from spectator support at OHCC's past major tournaments, golf fans must have gained appreciation for the course when Ben Hogan commented following his 1951 U.S. Open victory, "If there's a golf course any tougher, I don't want to play it." The most recent PGA played at Oakland Hills (in 1979) drew the largest gallery in the history of golf. More than 40,000 are expected to watch the course play the players at this year's U.S. Senior Open.
