

# Political 'office expenses' revealed

Patterson spent \$50 the next day for the Michigan Conservatives Luncheon, and \$35 a month later for a luncheon for Phillip Crane, a U.S. representative and one-time conservative presidential candidate. Patterson spent \$30 on a September Morality in Media dinner. He also paid \$12.50 in September for a one-third-page ad in an NAACP brochure.

He rented a \$52 tuxedo in June and paid \$112 to charter a SEMTA bus to transport senior citizens to the Oakland County Republican Ox Roast in September.

MURPHY'S OEF reported 1980 income of \$4,500, all of it from his campaign fund.

Compared to Patterson, Murphy spent proportionately less on supporting other candidates and more on himself since he faced a tougher re-election battle. Murphy spent \$2,500 on things different from donations to other candidates, and \$1,600 on candidate gifts. His OEF ended the year with a balance of \$540.

Murphy's non-candidate-related OEF expenses included \$501 to a Pontiac photographer for pictures, season tickets to the Detroit Express (\$120) and Pontiac-Oakland Symphony (\$100); \$100 for tickets to a Pistons game; \$25 for tickets to a testimonial dinner of the Puerto Rican Cultural Club; \$250 for membership in the Boy Scouts of America, and seven luncheons at the Detroit Economic Club.

He made donations to the Committee to Elect a Republican House (\$150); Republican Senate Majority Fund (\$100); the Oakland County Republican Committee 300 club (\$300); the Committee to Elect Howard Baker (\$100) and a number of gifts to various candidates for county office.

KUHNS' OEF reported \$1,750 in income for 1980, and differed from other countywide officeholders' funds in receiving a \$250 donation from a citizen, Eula Fyke of Berkeley. The other \$1,500 came from his campaign committee.

Kuhns' OEF reported expenses — unrelated to supporting other candidates — including \$68 on two separate staff Christmas luncheons in 1979; \$60 in October bills for gifts and an office Christmas party last year; \$137 in December bills for a staff Christmas party at the Fox and Hounds restaurant in Bloomfield Hills; \$40 for donuts for a public meeting of county officials; \$32 for a St. Patrick's Day luncheon with Deputy Drain Commissioner Robert H. Fredericks about the February Edison Corridor sewer collapse in Macomb County, and \$10 for an engineering society "Sea Power Symposium."

ALLEN'S OEF reported 1980 income for the clerk's fund at \$2,506, all but \$6 from his campaign committee.

Allen's OEF spent \$735 in donations to other candidates and 1,564 in other kinds of expenses including: A \$215 donation to the North Oakland Chamber of Commerce; \$65 in motor home repairs; \$25 to himself for convention expenses; \$45 in bowling league sponsorships; \$50 to the Boy Scouts; \$128 on office parties in December and \$42 on December gifts to employees.

DOHANY'S OEF reported receipts of \$2,155, most of it in individual donations. The two largest donations, both \$500, came from the Chaldean Iraqi Republican Committee of Orchard Lake and Dohany's campaign committee.

By far the largest expenditure not related to gifts to other candidates was \$934 in reimbursement to Dohany for unlisted expenses. Another \$378 was spent on an employee Christmas luncheon.

## 3 of 27 commissioners have officeholder funds

Three of 27 Oakland County Board of Commissioners maintained Officeholder Expense Funds last year.

John DiGiovanni, D-Hazel Park, received \$2,000 in donations to his OEF, all of it from his candidate committee.

DiGiovanni used nearly all his OEF on direct campaign costs, with biggest expenses being nearly \$900 to two companies for handout printings.

One of the few payments not clearly political was a \$20 January donation to a Hazel Park group called "Cops R Tops." He also donated \$20 each to Republicans Lynn Allen, the county clerk, and James

Lanni, a Royal Oak commissioner.

Commissioner Anne M. Hobar, R-Pontiac, received \$401 in her OEF, again all from her campaign committee. Her biggest single expense was \$54 for tickets to the Republican ox roast, and a \$50 membership fee to the state GOP was the second largest. Most other expenses were \$15 or \$20 tickets to various candidate fundraisers.

Commissioner Robert Page, R-Birmingham, received \$1,100 into his OEF last year. All of it came from his campaign finance committee. He donated \$840 to other political committees and spent \$450 on other purposes.

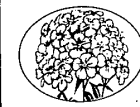
