Wayne State gridders stay in limbo

A lot has been written and said about the threat to drop football at Wayne State University. Bo Schembechler had his say, Now it's time for my two cents worth.

Football has been a tradition at Wayne. Alumni, fan and student interest, however, has never really been strong.

WSU's Board of Governors discussed last week WSU's Board of Governors discussed last week whether the sport should be eliminated because of the school's acute financial problems. The subject was tabled until Friday when the Board of Governors hold their monthly meeting. It was apparent after last week's discussion that the board is going to wait until December to make a final decision.

President Thomas Bonner has proposed that
football be dropped. His plan favors upgrading
men's and women's basketball to NCAA Division I
status. He would also like to create a varsity

status. He would also like to create a varsity soccer program.

The school is suffering economic hardships simular to those facing the city of Detroit. Bonne bopes to cut the athletic budget by 25 percent for the 1982-83 school year. He also has to trim \$9.4 million from his total budget.

Football is an expensive sport. It will cost the university approximately \$141,000 to run the program this fail.

Rookie head coach Dave Farris, a resident of Troy, is fighting an uphill battle. But with bis plan, Farris hopes he can convince the board to take another look once the 1981 season's over. His strategy is simple.

He's currently working on prominent business-men to help donate money. He wants the alumni to get more involved. He is reducing his staff (three full-time assistants to one) and will cut scholarship monies 25 percent.

Farris is also counting on a big turnout in Sep-tember when Michigan bolds Band Day. The Tar-tars will face Slippery Rock at Michigan Stadium. A crowd of more than 50,000 would bring in a good chunk of cash.

"I THINK the program is valuable both athleti-cally and academically," said Farris. "You gain some things other than the classroom. You learn how to be on time and function as a group. It's something we should hold onto. "I'm not trying to save the program because I need a job. I could have gone to Western New

For the second straight year, Wayne State will be part of a small-college double-header at the Pontiac Silverdome.

Td like to also maybe play a game out in the suburbs on a Saturday night against a Grand Valley, Farris said. "I think we could get a good crowd. I think it would be a good idea to play say, for instance, at a place centrally located like Birmingham Groves.

With these cuts, it would be be reduced to a NCAA Division II program, but I think we can still get the job done."

Vern Payne, the school's basketball coach, was recently named athletic director to replace the retiring Chalmers Hixon.

THE BASKETBALL program, also Division II, is far less expensive to operate than football. Payne enjoyed a great recruiting year, getting four Division Lealiber players. Payne, however, is still without a full-time paid assistant.

But it takes money, however, to run a Division I program. You need alumni support and the most important thing — a winner. Payne is very capable, but the risk is great.

WSU's neighbor, the University of Detroit, is a prime example. The Titans have a large and adequate facility and a top-notch schedule. The catch, however, is that winning generates dollars, something the school has lacked since Dick Vitale left. They barely broke even in their games at Joe Lucius last year. The university has been seeing its own coilor of late — red.

"I feel it's a real detriment to the university to drop football for other sports not as established," said Bob Van Gorder, a senior offensive guard from West Bioonfield. "I feel sorry for the guys underneath. I don't see basketball from football as the right step."

"When Bonner came in, he said he wanted to upgrade the football program. Now he's trying to discontinue it."
