Archdiocese responds to court's draft decision

The U.S. Supreme Court decision that women need not be included in registration for a military draft or the draft itself reaffirms the teaching of the U.S. Catholic Bishops, according to Father Richard Cassidy, director of the Archdiocese of Detroit's office for justice and peace.

"Since June of 1980, it has been the position of the Bishops that women should not be registered and should not be drafted," Cassidy said following the supreme court decision.

He said, "In light of that teaching, the court's decision is welcome; it could, however, present some pastoral difficulties."

Cassidy noted the decision might make it more difficult to present questions about the morality of military service to women. The questions are part of the Archdiocese's Conscience Formation Program, which is presented to students in local high schools.

"In our program, we stress it is important for young people to form their own consciences about military service," explained Cassidy. "We let them

know that military service and conscientious objection are both approved options and that they themselves have to determine where they stand."

"Now," Father Cassidy continued, "it may be more difficult to encourage young women to address this question. My hope is that they will continue to do so as a means of supporting their brothers and friends in their decisions."

He added that the six priests involved in making the Conscience Formation presentation had found high school girls to be just as interested and responsive as the boys.

"Many of the girls were aware that the coming supreme court decision might require them to register, and they saw it as a question for conscience formation," said Father Cassidy. "I hope that they will continue to see it in the same way."

Senior high youths from Orchard United Methodist Church will sponsor a run/walkathon from 8 a.m. to noon Saturday, July 15, to raise funds to continue work they have participated in for Mountain TOP.

TOP is the acronym for Tennessee Outreach Project, a program that aids elderly and needy persons in the eastern part of the state with repairs and maintenance of their homes.

Area youths who gave several weeks of their vacation working for TOP this summer returned with the idea of a fund-raiser to aid TOP with

money to purchase materials that are necessary for these repairs.

"They are going the second mile," is the way Rev. James F. Thomas described the project.

TOP asks for contributions from the people it helps, but these people just don't have any money to give at all," Thomas said.

"Our youths were part of a group of 72 workers from Florida, Georgia, Tennessee and Michigan."

"They worked for 44 economically disadvantaged families who needed home repairs as well as someone to say 'we care about you.'"

But supplies were scarce. Now they want to add to their original contribu-

tion," Thomas said.

THOSE WHO worked for TOP this summer in Ozone, Tenn., ask youth of the community to either run or walk around Harrison High School's track on the Saturday during Founders Festival to aid in the project for the mountain residents.
