Contrary to normal seasonal paterns, Michigan's jobless rate dropped in June for the fourth straight mouth, falling to 11.1 percent from May's 11.5 percent, according to estimates released by Michigan Employment Security Commission (MESC) Director S. Martin Taylor.

Taylor added the signs of economic recovery are especially evident when this June's estimates are compared to last year's. Michigan's June 1980 jobless rate was 14.3 percent, with 628,000 people out of work.

Taylor attributed the unemployment-drop to growth in the construction, re-tail trades, and service industries, as well as gains in agriculture and self-employment. Automotive and related industry employment remained stable. While Michigan's unemployment rate fell in May, the national rate also dropped, declining from 7.6 percent in May to 7.3 percent in June.




