Educators argue over preschoolers

"We went out of business (June 22), but we really don't have any bad feelings about it. It was entirely our decision to merge with them. They didn't force us out of business."
"Both sides benefited with the merger. We offered them some of our equipment. Our profit margin may be less than before, but our taxes will be lower, we won't have to pay rent on the building, and we won't have to foot with enrollment or administrative work," Karhu said.

With a gymnasium and a playground at Alameda, the FPS will have the best equipment and facilities in the city, and will be the most attractive preschool organization, according to Karhu.
Barbara Tangora, Karhu's former partner, agrees with Karhu's assessment of the merger with, and facilities provide at Alameda.

"We are not mad at these people (FPS officials)," Tangora said. "They are doing us a big favor by taking us in."

"Besides their tuition is less than ours used to be because they don't have the overhead, whereas we had to rent the building," Tangora said.

The Early Childhood Nursery used to charge \$4.50 a day for a 2-1 1/2 hour session, according to Karhu. The district charged \$3 a day for a two-hour session, Howell said.

That difference adds up to a sizeable sum for the duration of the school year, according to one nursery school director.

"We (several private preschool di-

rectors) are afraid to speak out publicly because we feel it will hurt our schools — the Fairview teachers are a part of our organization," she said.

"But I feel the public schools are moving too fast and getting too involved into a private enterprise field. It seems it is the same private versus public school argument all over again. I just don't see where they have the right."
