Wayne extension offers Master Shopper program

Cooperative Extension Service of Wayne County offers "The Master Shopper Program" on Thursdays beginning Oct. 1.

The course teaches how to become more knowledgeable in the supermarket and then pass on the knowledge to others. After the six-week program, participants are asked to volunteer about 20 hours.

Classes include visuals, lectures, demonstrations and taste samples. Topics for discussion include grains, breads and cereals, vegetables and fruits, fish and poultry, meats and dairy items.

When participants become "master shoppers," they will be asked to volunteer their time answering phones in the extension service offices, working with families on Social Security or food stamps, taking personal or group shopping tours, and working with young married couples.

Cost for the program is \$20. Enrollment is limited to 25. Registration must be made by Sept. 25.

Format for the sale remains as in past years. Residents contribute books by taking them to the Farmington Hills Community Library on 12 Mile Road, or placing them in the marked barrels in cooperating supermarkets. Barrels are located now in the A&P in the Downtown Shopping Center,

Great Scott at 13 Mile and Orchard Lake roads, and the Kroger store on Grand River near Halstead Road.

All types of books are accepted. AAUW members begin sorting, classifying and pricing used books almost immediately after one sale in preparation for the next.

Proceeds from the sale are used to further education, both nationally and locally. Some of the funds are contributed for local projects.

She is the mother of teenager Caroline and 5-year-old twins, Andrew and Ellen, and has become involved in school and civic work, as well as AAUW, since her move here.

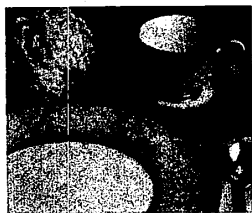
Marjorie Conover and Phyllis Cummings head up affairs when the books are moved from the library to the mall for the sale.
