Some foods and drugs don't mix, FDA warns

When you take medication, there may be some foods you should avoid eating. For instance, you should not take tetracycline, a widely prescribed autibiotic, with a glass of milk, since the calcium in milk impairs absorption of the tetracycline.

The U.S. Food and Drug administration warns that the effects of food and drugs on each other can determine whether the medications do their job. And some combinations of food and medication can exhall be democrated.

THE MOST dangerous food and drug combina-tion is aged cheese or Chianti wine with monoamine oxidase (MAO) inhibitors, prescribed for depression and high blood pressure. MAO linhibitors react bad-by with a substance caled tyramine in foods like chicken livers, susages and wines.

The reaction can cause the blood pressure to soar

to dangerous levels, sometimes causing severe headaches, brain hemorrhage, and, in extreme cas-se, eren dealth. To avoid a reaction, also tiay away from aged or fermented foods; sharp or aged cheeses; hananas; and even cola beverages, coffee and chocolate.

As a general rule, remember that alcohol, which
is actually a drug litself, does not mix well with
antibiotics, setaltives, anticoagulants, antidiated
drugs, including insulin, antihistamines, high blood
pressure drugs and MAO inhibitors.

Certain medications you take can increase your
need for specific foots. For example, people who
take diuretics regularly should eat foods rich in potassium. Sources of potassium are tomatoes, tomato juice, oranges, orange juice and bananas.

WOMEN ON birth control pills should eat more

green leafy vegetables which are a good source of folic acid. Oral contraceptives are known to deplete the flood of folic acid and vitamin B6. Mineral oil, an old-fashioned laxative still used widely, can hinder the absorption of vitamin D, vi-

tamin K and cartene, a substance the body converts to vitamin A.
What you take your medication with is important, too. Check with your doctor, but you're generally on the safe side if you take your medication with water. Swallowing the medication with owner, Swallowing the medication with output yet medication with your system.
Also ask your doctor when the drug should be taken — on an empty stomach or after meals — and also whether it's safe to drink alcohol. And don't be afraid to ask how drugs might interact with your favorite edibles. Be sure to tell your doctor about any unusual symptoms that follow eating particular foods.

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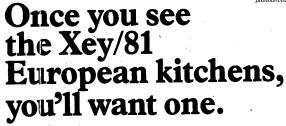
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
