Emergency fund deleted . The "new majority" on the Walled Lake school board flaxed its muscles last week and amended the 1981-82 budget resolution to eliminate the su-perintendent's emergency spending clause peri clau

clause. The amendment also spread the ap-propriations in the 1981-82 budget over a larger number of categories. Voting on the amendment was strict-ly along "new majority/old majority" lines as board President Kenneth Tuck-

If access hand President Kenneth Tuck-er and Trustes David Robby, Janet Cal-lahan and Patricia Jackman cast af-firmative votes. Dissenting ballots were tast by Trustes Robert Copper, Betty Campion and Mario Tozzi. At issue wars a clause in the 1881-82 budget which granted the superintend-ent emergency spending powers up to \$50,000. The emergency spending clause was approved prior to the time that the balance of power on the school board shifted when Robby and Jack-man assumed their seats in July.

ALL PUBLIC bodies this year are re-quired by law to operate under the Uni-form Budgeting Act. In essence, the law requires public bodies to adopt budgets which earmark specific ex-penditures in certain areas and prohl-bits funds from being moved from one

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area to another without approval from dected officials. For example, funds earmarked for transportation cannot be transferred to a maintenance account unless the transfer preceives board approval. The iaw also permits lected offi-clais to give the chief administrative officer — the superintendent, in the case of school districts — emergency spending powers. When the former Walled Lake school board adopted its 1981-82 budget prior

The clause also stated that the superintend-ent's use of the power must be reported to and approved by the school board at its next regular meeting. The movement to delete the clause was spearheaded by Jackman, who said it was the intent of the law to per-mit elected officials to be more aware of transfers which occurs to they can be better informed about the budget pro-cess.
