# Pep talk inspires Angels to title

Farmington Angels' soccer coach John Magee feared a letdown last Friday that might cost his team a shot at its second straight league title.

Three girls were missing for the team's Great Lakes Women's Soccer League (GLWCL) finale against the Huron Valley Grass Kickers, a squad that the Angels had to rally to beat, 4-2, in their first meeting.

The absence — one player having her tonsils removed, another her wisdom teeth pulled and the third working — left Magee with only one substitute, and that was the backup goalkeeper.

In Magee's estimation, it was definitely time for a pep talk. "It seemed to work," the Angels first and only coach said. "They had the ball in the net within three minutes."

The Angels put the ball in the net a few more times after that, whitewashing Huron Valley 8-0 behind ace goal-scorer Nancy Glynn's six markers.

GLYNN, A GRADUATE of Bloomfield Hills Lahser now attending Babson College in Massachusetts, accounted for 28 tallies in helping the Angels post an 8-1-1 season record.

In the GLWCL's two years of existence, the Angels have won the title both times, compiling an overall mark

of 14-1-1. This year, the league opted for a split-division format, with the better teams in the upper league and less-talented squads in the lower group.

The result was improved competition, Magee said, making it harder for his girls to defend their championship.

Magee, who came to the United States from England 18 years ago, credited his staff and players for the two championships. His assistant coach, George Grantham, came with Magee from England. Ethel Larson is the team's manager in all league matters, and Ben Slomberg is the trainer.

While Glynn was far and away the team's top scorer, several others contributed. Patty Larson and Caroline Trout each collected six goals, Trout scoring in the Huron Valley contest.

Julie Stachecki, a midfielder, also netted a goal against the Grass Kickers. It was her first score of the season.

LARSON MISSED the final game with tonsillitis. She almost missed the game with the Livonia Soccer Club the previous week — or at least she should have.

"I was never so surprised when I saw her walk onto the field with that (hospital) tag on her arm," Magee recalled. "She went into the hospital that night and was to get her tonsils out the next day."

Apparently her doctor was a soccer fan, because she convinced him to let

her out for the game."

Three of Magee's players attend

Lahser High School, including Trout.

He is counting on them for the future.

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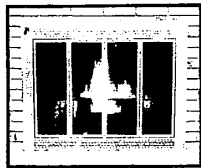
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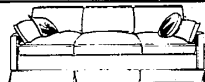
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## CITY OF FARMINGTON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS (Summary)

A Regular meeting of the Farmington City Council was held Monday, August 17, 1981, at 8:00 p.m. in the Council Chambers, 23600 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan.

PRESENT: Mayor Hartsock, Councilmen Bennett, Topper, Mitchell.

ABSENT: Councilman Yoder.

CITY OFFICIALS PRESENT: City Manager Deadman, Dir. Billing, Lt. Santomaro, City Attorney Kelly, City Clerk Bushey.

The minutes of previous meetings were approved.

The minutes of other Boards were received and/or filed.

A Public Hearing was held to review the City's requirement to install sidewalks along the south side of Grand River from Gill Road west to Halsted Road.

Council authorized a property split of Parcel 23-27-377-008 requested by Mr. and Mrs. William F. Roles, Jr.

The closing of Warner Street was approved for a September 18th Block Party.

A letter regarding the Sidewalk Repair Program was received and filed.

Council accepted an award from AAA for the City's past three-year record of no pedestrian fatalities.

Proclamations were issued designating "Constitution Week" September 17-18, and commemorating the Battle of Yorktown.

The following ordinances were introduced:

Ordinance C-480-81 which would regulate the conversion of residential structures to nonresidential uses.

Ordinance C-481-81 "Industrial Waste and Nonresidential Surcharge Ordinance"

Council adopted a resolution for self-insurance application to the Secretary of State.

Council accepted the low bid of McCarthy Contracting Company for the 1981 Pavement Patching Program in the amount of \$17,200.

Final payment on the 1980 Road Improvement Program in the amount of \$2,000 was authorized to McCarthy Contracting Company.

The first estimated payment of \$15,489 to A.S.I., Inc., on modifying the Municipal Building heating and cooling system, was authorized by Council.

Public comments were received.

Robert Walker was appointed to the Farmington Historical Commission.

The following reports were received and filed:

Financial Report General Fund 12 months ended June 30, 1981.

Financial Report 47th District Court 12 months ended June 30, 1981.

Monthly bills were approved for payment.

Meeting adjourned at 9:55 p.m.

## CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS

### SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS CITY COUNCIL MEETING AUGUST 24, 1981

Farmington Hills City Council held a regular meeting August 24, 1981. Mayor Wolf opened the meeting at 7:30 p.m. Members present were: Burwell, Soronen, Oppenheimer, Wolf, Alkateeb and Lange. Dolan absent. Others present were City Manager Savage, City Clerk Cairns, Assistant City Manager Costick and City Attorney Bibeau.

August 17, 1981 minutes were approved.

Council enacted zoning map amendment C82-259 - lot 59 of Supervisor's Plat of Woodcreek Farms No. 1, rezoning from RA-1A to OS-3.

Zoning text amendment C82-259 was enacted amending Section 404 of the Zoning Ordinance to expressly permit and regulate the parking of certain commercial vehicles in Single-Family Residential Districts subject to special conditions and approved the summary.

Zoning text amendment C82-259 was enacted amending Section 407, One-Family Clustering Option, to allow said alternate means of single-family development in the RA-1B, One-Family Residential District, as well as the RA-1, RA-2, RA-3 and RA-4 Single-Family Residential Districts. Further, said amendment is reorganized and expanded to more clearly express the discretionary development standards which will be reviewed for this type of development, and approved the summary.

Zoning text amendment C82-259 was enacted amending Section 1904, subparagraph (c) to regulate the parking in the Industrial Districts for those industrial uses or research establishments in related accessory office use to provide five parking spaces plus one for every one and one-half employees in the largest working shift, or one for each 450 square feet of useful floor area, whichever is greater, and Section 1914, paragraph 4, removing the "color requirement" for poured concrete walls, and approved the summary.

Proposed Vacation of a portion of Valley Road between Old Colony and Northwest was tabled until September 14, 1981.

The request from North Farmington High School to hold their Homecoming Parade on Saturday, October 17, 1981 was approved.

Council approved the project plan for the Economic Development Corporation of the City of Farmington Hills, Carrefour Project and set a public hearing date to be September 14, 1981.

Upon the recommendation of the City Manager the following action was taken: Accept the bid of Reichard International for one new 1981 International Dump Truck and Components in the amount of \$48,700; accept the bid of Cose Power & Equipment Company for one Four Wheel Drive Front End Loader in the amount of \$23,737 including trade-in of the City's J.D. 544-A Loader; accept the bid of M/M Auto Parts for one Peerless 1222 Console and No. 627 Scope Analyzer in the amount of \$5,659.50.

The contract for the 1981 Concrete Replacement Program was awarded to the low bidder, McCarthy Contracting Company in the amount of \$5,912.50.

The contract for the 1981 Joint and Crack Sealing Program was awarded to the low bidder, Conco Midwest, Inc. of Arkansas in the amount of \$133,372.

Request from Pimental Social Club, 38550 Nine Mile Road, for the completion of the six foot fence enclosing three sides of their property was approved subject to approval of site plan.

Council approved the contract agreement with Fire Fighters Local 2659.

Upon motion meeting was adjourned.
