I point with the same checker. For this and similar positions, a "tempo play" can similar perfective. Mineopy refrective. Theory for the same set of the same set of a tempo play is to steal your opponent's earlier roll (or half a roll by hitting one checker), which will tempo-rarily stop him from crushing you on his next roll. Black will be busy re-m-tering both checkers from the bar and, except for a perfect double, cannot harm white. Of course, the only risk 'for these moves is being hit back. But if you are hit, the tempo play is worth risking as forward anchor in your opponent's home board or reposition yourself. Also, since white has the doubling cube, he can alford a guty play. In this position, the game could easily turn to harow white, i black stays on the bar for one roll. If white can cover his 1 black's blot on the 8 point, white may be in position to redouble black to 4. Remember, backgammon is made up of continuous calculated to 'isks. Al-ways playing the game "safe" really takes all the funct of it!
