At the city gates, a uniformed policeman stopped the bus and asked us something. Since we speak neither French nor the locally-brewed Creole, we never did find out what he wanted. But he seemed satisfied when we pulled out our pink tourist cards. Except for that one spot, police along the condition of the conditio

we longed up the other bank and went on our way.

AS THE MILES UNFOLDED, so did the face of rural Hailt. The land is a curious mixture of lush tropics and parched desert. Muct-walled huts were roofed with pain thatch. Mango trees grew between the houses, lines of trained cotts took the placed of trees, sat women and children near mats pained high with mangoes. Besides them stood gallon jars of light-brown paste. It was peanut butter — Haitian style with lots of spice.

People along the road shouted. Others waved. When we stopped scant inmitted in tiny crossroad towns, friends passed pekages to riders. Ridrar passed packages to friends. And sellers with fruit or bright plink soda pop howered around the windows.

The streets were lined with piles of wares for sale — row upon row of plastic sandals, straw hats, silverware, enamel pols. Corn drieft in the sunder polse of the proposed o

town was behind us.

Sometimes we would overtake another tap tap. Could we pass on the narrow mountain roads? The drivers were

very careful, understandable when one considers that the tap tap driver is also owner. He is jockeying his life's investment through a country were the average annual wage is \$130.

BEYOND THE FIRST CROP of mountains south of Cap Haitien, the land turns to dust. The bananas and paya, the lush greenness and red clay soil give way to cream sand and cactus

trees whose fuzzy trunks are topped with spine-studded plates for leaves. Vast forests of these strange trees line the roads. The scrubby mountains look like the American southwest.

The desert is broken often by unex-pected green, by a vestpocket rain for-est or a couple square miles of rice paddies. Eventually, we broke through the

last mountain pass and came back down to the sea. The mud-walled huts drew closer and closer together. There was a brick-walled building. Then two. And finally, we plunged back into ur-ban life at the outskirts of Port au Prince.

This was not our first tap tap ride in Haiti. Like everybody else around, we took to hopping them for the 30-mile

trip from our resort to town. We learned, the hard way, that it's best to use paper money. American quarters—though worth one and a half paper gourds—are exactly the size and feel of a Haitian coin worth pennies.

There are far kinder things to do to one's body then spend half a day in 2 tap tap. But it would be a shame to miss the adventure.

Remember the car stuffing contests of the 1950s? Add a couple of chickens, a goat or two and some errant furniture on the roof. Then paint it like an Easter egg and you've got the picture of your average tap tap.




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Haiti's moving art is a colorful display of imagination displayed on trucks and buses. Artists say the best way to hide dents and scratches is to make them part of the scenes.





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
