Market continues at center

Something new in Farmers' Market now that canning time approaches is that customers will be invited to place orders in advance for bushels of fresh

orders in advance for bushels of fresh produce.

The market continues from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Saturdays through September on the grounds of Farmington Community Center, 24705 Farmington Road.

One of the most popular vendors at the market this summer is Kauly Koch, whose New York-style cheesecake is a weekly sellout.

"All the flavors are selling well the syear," said Ms. Koch, who turns out hundreds of cakes every week from her store at 18801 McNichols Rd., in Detroit.

"We offer a cake that's rich and creamy, with fresh eggs, genuine vanilla and natural fruit flavors."

"A productive hive will have about 100,000 bees and one queen," Rist said.

Kathy's cheesecakes come in choco-late, cherry pineapple, raspberry and blueberry.

Another popular vendor is Russ Rist, a beekeeper from Brighton who sells honey under the center's tents each Saturday.

Rist keeps 175 hives, each yielding about 60 pounds of a honey a year, and distributes the nectar at four markets in the area.

"A good queen will lay 1,000-1,200 eggs a day with a three-year average of productivity. Nature takes care of replacing the queen in a hive through a process called supercedure. That's a takeover from within the hive by a female who steps up production of fertile eggs when the retiring queen's productivity begins to fail."

Hand-woven baskets, gingham-cov-ered boxes, some straw flowers and se-lected handcrafted items are up for sale along with plants, some fresh flo-wers and the produce of the fall hap-vest.


