Free ice water built a mini-empire

WALL, S.D. — Free Ice Water! Five-cent coffee. A life-size animated cow-boy band that sings! And signs. They're just some of the elements that help make up Wall Drug.

Its a far cry today! from the Depression year of 1931, when Ted and Dorsh Hustead bought a small drug store in the dusty, small western South Dakot town of Wall. Ted, a young pharmacy graduate, was just making his way in the world. "The early years were tough." he recalls.

Then, one day, Dorothy had an inspiration. Why not put out signs advertising free ice walls.

It was a subtle stroke of genius after the signs were treeched, weary, when the property is to mention.

it was a subtraction grains, are it he signs were erected, weary, dusty travelers began stopping to quench their thirst. They usually bought a hamburger or a few souvenirs, too, and the Wall Drug epic began.

THE FIRST ice water machine at Wall Drug was a Rube Golberg contraption, designed by Trd, that consistent of a 1,000-gallon cistern with pure spring water from Wasta, a little town down the road and a few miles west. Volume was about five hundred gallons a day. From the cistern a garden hose ran to a 30-gallon elevated tank in the old drug store. Each morning Ted pumped the tank full, and took in a supnity of ice.

Today's travelers, motoring in air conditioned cars, still stop for the free ice water, sometimes as many as 15,000 a day.

THOSE DEPRESSION lessons helped make Bill and Ted Hustead shrewd businessmen. "When we decided to enlarge in the 1950s, we took a hard look at things. It was the first time in our lives we wre solvent," Bill



London and all over the United States and the world. "We started giving out 25,000 free Wall Drug signs a year to visitors. Those signs went out and are up all over the world. And the people came.
"We invoke delions, writers, broadcasters, and suddenly Wall Drug stories began appearing in every newspaper in the U.S., from the New York Times to the smallest South Dakota weekly."

TODAY, WALL Drug doesn't cost the tourist a cent. "For free, you can see one of the finest, Western art colletions in the midwest, an excellent collection of Indian artifacts, the animated cowboy band, and the list goes on and on," says Ted Husted. "Ice water is still free, and coffee's a nickel. And if you don't want to purchase anything, you don't have to."

But it's not easy to get in and out of Wall Drug without buying something. Best sellers vary, but with a choice of 6,000 pairs of cowboy boots, a boxen load of western straw hats, one of the finest choice of western books, rocks, Black Hills gold, and so on, it's hard to leave without buying.

"The best selling items are the native-crafted works, says Ted. "Mocsains made at Pine Righe, Black Hills gold made in Rapid City and Deadwood.
