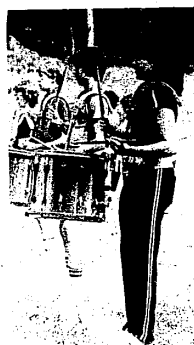
Now they will join colleagues from Farmington and North Farmington for
