Culminating a day of reunion festivities will be an awards ceremony at the

Detroit Golf Club, with Eleanor Dreyer (Class of '45) of Farmington the chairwoman. Three alumni and community leaders will receive Marygrove awards for their leadership and commitment.

Mrs. Dreyer is the immediate past president of the alumni association and a former member of Marygrove's board of trustees.

The reunion for the Class of 1956 will be the hands of Frances Culver of Farmington Hills.

Overseeing the entire homecoming day's activities is Kathryn Gerbig Koval (Class of '70) and president of the alumni association, Janet Heidrich (Class of '59).

Chairwoman of the Farmington Marygrove Alumni Chapter is Susan Donovan.

Farmington artist Edith (Edee) Jopich will be displaying her collages and watercolors in Marygrove's own gallery during homecoming. This is Marygrove's first of a series of invitational Alumni Art Exhibits and is expected to draw a large crowd during the weekend.

The award is given in the name of Mother Domitilla Donohue, IHM, the General Superior of the Immaculate Heart of Mary sisters and founder of Marygrove College. Mrs. Cronyn's civic works and her dedication to the college exemplify the spirit of Mother Domitilla, a reunion spokeswoman said.

A second Marygrove Alumni award will be presented to Eleanor M. Josaitis, co-founder and associate director of Detroit civil-rights organization Focus: Hope.

Mrs. Josaitis will receive the "Dr. George H. Derry Award," in honor of the first president of Marygrove College (1927). This award, not given since the early 1970s, honors a civic leader who has shown outstanding leadership and commitment to the Detroit community.

Mrs. Josaitis co-founded Focus: Hope in 1968 with Father Bill Cunningham to address what they saw as social injustices in Detroit. Her leadership in help to the poor, especially in the feeding of low-income mothers and children, led to her being selected as the 1981 Career Guild Woman of the Year.
