Musicians To Welcome Spring's First Tuesday

FARMINGTON Spring begins on March 20, and on the following Tuesday, March 24, the Farmington Community Concert Band will play a concert entitled "First Tuesday of Spring."

At 8 p.m. on that evening in the new auditorium at North Farmington High, the 65 musicians will play a program as full of color as the concert's name. Admission to the concert is free and nursery service will be provided by senior Girl Scout Troop 804.

PAUL BARBER, as usual, will be on the podium for this second program of the year for the concert band.

He has selected a varied repertoire, which includes an overture, a prelude and fugue, a suite of dances, a musical comedy tune, some music from "Porgy and Bess," and of course some good, foot-beating marches.

Barber says he made his selections to be in keeping with the season of the year.

Since the band played its first concert of the year in November, the number of its musicians has grown from 50 to 65.

A highlight of the March 24 concert will be the opening of the second half after intermission. At that time School Superintendent Roderick Smith and Dr. Edwin

Blumberg, president of the Exchange Club, will beat the heritage drum given to the band by Floyd Sallow. The drum was used by Sallow's grandfather, Henry Sallow, in the Farmington band of the early 1900s.

FINANCIAL SPONSORSHIP of the band is the Exchange Club's number one project. Assistance also comes from Oakland Community College, which lends music and instruments, and Farmington public schools.

Bill Conroy, the band's executive director, looks on membership in the band as a means of bridging the generation gap. Conroy says: "We have

consider that we play college level music." Conroy foresees a great future for the Farmington Concert Band in the Farmington community. "It has the potential of growing to something of considerable importance and of great value to the community," he says.
