Road board won't close Troy garage

The Oakland County Road Commission won't have to scrap use of its Troy garage, as previously planned. In mid-Newmer road commission Managing Director John Grubba recommended eliminating Troy garage services between March 26 and Oct 31 because of expected shortfall of state-collected gasoline and weight taxes. But after re-availating the upcoming budget, he noted that liability instance premiums will be less than anticipated, allowing the continuation of of intill-year Troy garage service. The Troy garage is used to store sow removal equipment, salt and road repair equipment to serve the eastern portion of Oakland County.

In other business last week, the

three-member road commission accepted the James Agency's Insurance package proposal for 1982 coverages requiring premiums of \$414,000. That's \$231,000 less than anticipted in Grub-ba's orginal 1982 budget recommendation and \$153,400 less than actual premium costs in 1981.

"We are indeed fortunate to be able to transfer budgeted amounts from in-surance preium costs to operations," Grubba said.
