How to store If you plan to use within a couple of days, tear off a corner of the waxed paper or foil. Because the store wrap is virtually air tight, ground beef tends to darken inside. Once exposed to air. Its bright color will "bloom" again. For storing longer than two days, repackage , the meat in freezer wrap and freeze.

Cooking frozen hamburger paties is alright. but because It takes longer, the meat usually turns out well done. Handle the ground beef as little as possible. The gentler you are: the tenderer it is. When cooking, turn the paties only once. Flipping back and forth loses juices. Finally, undercooking is better than overcooking because the heat in the patty will continue the cooking action after removal from the range. grill or broiler.
