CITY OF FARMINGTON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS (Summary)

A Special Meeting of the Farmington City Council was held on Wednesday, February 10, 1982, in the Council Chambers, 23600 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan. The meeting convened at 7:45 p.m.

PRESENT: Mayor Bennett, Councilmen Hartsock, Mitchell, Yoder.

ABSENT: Councilman Tupper.

OTHERS PRESENT: City Manager Deadman, Dir. Seifert, Fire Marshall Maddison, Assessor Sailer, G. Horner.

Council reviewed data provided by the City Assessor describing the proposed program for developing 1982 assessed valuations for real property. Mr. Sailer stated that the County proposes to allow local assessors to use a current 12-month sales study for residential property in determining 1982 assessed property valuations, as it is more reflective of current property values. Council agreed to consider, at their next regular meeting, the position taken by Oakland County concerning the 12-month sales study.

Manager Deadman informed Council that the evaluation of the Public Safety Department's fire equipment needs for the coming year indicated the Department could effectively utilize a fire ladder truck in its everyday fire suppression function.

Director of Public Safety Seifert informed Council of the results of the Department's inquiry into assembling various components of a fire pumper/ladder truck. He determined that the equipment could be purchased for a total of \$195,000.00. Council reviewed the proposals and requested that a formal presentation be developed for consideration at a future meeting.

Council considered a study of recreational services presently being provided to Farmington citizens. They determined to continue purchasing services from the City of Farmington Hills, and that the adult organized baseball teams would be charged \$100.00 per team per season for the use of the lighted ball fields. Council requested that the City of Farmington Hills be contacted to determine their future plans for park expansion so as to alleviate some of the pressure on the City's current park system.

There was a discussion concerning fiscal year 1982-83 revenue projects and Council's philosophy relative to the delivery of local services. Council indicated that it would further review priorities for local services during the development of next year's budget.

The meeting adjourned at 10:30 p.m.
