## Indian exhibit opens

The early spring exhibit at the Plymouth Historical Museum running now through April 25 features Indian artifacts from several tribes.

The exhibit will afford visitors a rare

The exhibit will afford visitors a rare opportunity to view objects from several private collections. It is certain to have appeal to a wide range of ages. Tribes represented include Chippewa, Sioux, Apache, Great Lakes tribes, Northwest tribes and Eskimos.

Northwest tribes and Eskimon.

Among the artifacts will be seen a Siour Chost Dance shirt dating from the late 1830s, a heavy breastplate made up of dozens of small cylindrical bones. Eskimo carvings, such as a neckace of ivory with tiny sled dogs and polar bears, a carved hadia rattle, and a pair of Eskimo mukhuls (boots). An Apache bow has a facing of buffalo sinew for strength and resilience.

sinew for strength and resilience. There are many prehistoric objects: arrowhead making tools, needles, copperwork from Upper Pensimsali sondians, a harpoon used for fish spearing and fish hooks.

Tools and weapons, such as war clubs, tomahawis, "shall-crushers, and squaws" implements may be seen. A Sioux medicine man (massacquin) in full ceremonial dress, a carrow whale-hone Eskimo mask, Iroquois musak, and ther items of dress are out display.
