# Students are stung by U.S. aid cuts

Middle-income students and single parents will be hurt most by the Reagan administration's pro-posed education cuts in the fiscal 1885 budget, and Oakland Community College official says. "Educators have a hard time understanding di-minishments in human investment. We'll always-come down on the side of human investment, said Spencer Jobson, director of financial aid at Oak-land Community College.

THIS FISCAL year, Washington is dispensing \$11

THIS FISCAL year, Wasangton is dispensing \$1: billion to college students and universities. President Ronald Reagan proposes a 25-percent cut for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1. Largest is Guaranteed Student Loans, currently a \$7.7 billion. Reagan proposes stricter eligibility requirements and commercial interest rates inat \$1.7 mumb. assessing the requirements and commercial interest rates in-stead of the fixed 9 percent. Currently, the guaran-ted student lonas program aids 3.5 million stu-dents, 52 percent more than last year.
Pell grants would be cut 40 percent. The self-help College Work-Study grants would also be cut. Sup-plemental Educational Opportunity Grants would be climinated entirely.
Protests have occurred at the University of

Michigan, where an estimated two-thirds of the dent body is receiving some kind of aid or loan.

MORE THAN 5,000 OCC students - about 40 ercent of the full-timers - receive some type of percent of the full-timers — receive some type of financial aid. Cuts will prevent many from continu-ing their education, said Johnson.

If students can't afford to buy books and supplies, they can't afford to go to school, he added.

The middle class will be hurt by Reagan's cuts, Johnson believes. If Congress approves them, people in the \$18,000-\$30,000 income bracket will not qualify for grants, and those above \$30,000 will be unable to obtain loans, he said.

AMONG THE hardest hit by the cuts are women belonging to the Student Association for Self-Survival and Independence, he said.
This OCC group is made up of women, many of whom are receiving Aid to Dependent Children and trying to get and education so that they can become self-supporting.


