"They had one photo session that lasted four hours," Pearce said. "They have a few perks waiting for them while we're in Washington, like visiting the zoo, but for the most part, they will

be smiling and standing in line greeting people — not an easy thing for children this age.

"They'll be on a pretty snappy schedule, and they did work very hard with their new dance routine."

Johnston, who owns and operates Betty Johnston Studios in Farmington, said, "They are up to it. I've never seen another 5-year-old who could learn the dance these kids put together in two weeks."

Brett has already been tapped for the school system's gifted program, and kindergarten teachers at Beechwood suspect Kimberlie and Kristie will follow suit when they are tested late in the spring.

"They are intelligent and beautiful and healthy," their mother said. "They are marvelous examples of life that needs to be preserved. That's why it is so important that we work as hard as we can to raise funds for research."

"I want to show them off so people will be moved to ask, 'What is this disease?'"

The cause of cystic fibrosis remains a mystery. It affects the lungs and the pancreas and is believed to be inherited

by both parents contributing a single gene which carries the disease.

It is the most serious of the lung-damaging diseases and occurs once in every 1,600 births. It is believed to shorten the life spans of those afflicted.

"Every once in a while we'll hear about some lab that has come up with another little piece of information, something else we might try, something being worked on, but so far nothing that has extended life," Pearce said.

"But we had more bowlers this year than ever before, so the word is spreading. And we have marvelous support from our friends."

Among the friends she speaks of is Betty Johnston, "who had half the dance studio out bowling for us and spreads the word about research for cystic fibrosis almost as much as I do," Pearce said.

Another who helped was Carol Dunn, a Harrison High student, who has been the children's sitter for three years. Her contribution was 14 hours of free babysitting.

The bowlers at Country Lanes rolled strikes and spares for the second largest amount of money raised in the metropolitan area.

Order blanks will be sent on request by calling sale co-chairwomen Deddie Swan at 553-7240 or Beth Callow at 476-9034.

Club members must receive the filled order forms by May 1 to assure that ample quantities will be available on pick-up day, May 20.

Callow opens her front lawn, at 25575 Inkster Road, 1-5 p.m. for orders to be picked up.

"The bottom of the form has a space where customers can list plants they would like us to try to get for them. These won't be added to the reserved order, but we will try to have them available," Swan said.

"There are always late-minute extras that we pick up if a new color of zinnias or a new variety of anything happens to be available. We just put these out for shoppers who stop," she said. "And there hasn't been a pick-up day in memory that we've had any leftovers."

PRICES EVERY year are competitive.

"We ask around beforehand to see what the plants are going to sell for and we've always been able to sell what we offer at a very good price. The plants are all top quality and the hanging baskets this year are magnificent," she said.

In addition to the hanging baskets, 19 different flowering plants, including a few vegetables, with a large variety of colors in each species are listed on the order form.

Plants can be ordered by the flat, half flat or tray.

Hanging baskets run \$8.50-10 with choice of color for impatiens, petunias, begonias and fushias.

Order blanks include a brief description of each plant, its potential height, care for growing and where best it should be planted.

Swan suggests purchasers retain the descriptive notes that accompany the order form to get maximum enjoyment from their summer garden.

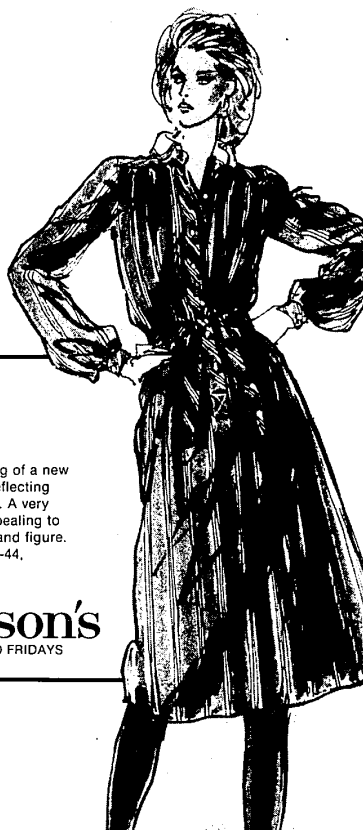
