Leo Knight Has Studio In Area

After 15 years in business in Detroit, award-winning portrait and commercial photographer Leo Knight has moved his studio to Southfield, where he and his family live.

Leo Knight Studio is now located in a building he designed on a two-acre site at 12 Mile and Northwestern. Two camera rooms, a large reception area and complete photographic processing facilities are highlighted by a two-story Georgian foyer.

A STAFF OF SIX, including Knight and two other full-time photographers, handle a variety of assignments ranging from advertising illustrations to passport photos.

Knight was Michigan "professional photographer of the year" in 1964 and is rated as a master of photography by the Professional Photographers of America Association (PPA).

A graduate of the PPA Wilmore School of Photography, Knight is chairman of the PPA Business Management Committee commercial division and is a member of the PPA Council.

He is past president of the PPA-affiliated Detroit Professional Photographers Association and of the Professional Photographers of Michigan, and a member of the Michigan Photographers Society and the American Society of Photographers.

Farmington Chemist Excited Over Bugs

Ask a research chemist to explain in simple terms just what he does in his laboratory, and he is stumped as to how to explain his work in layman's terms.

Dr. Tche-Tsing Tchen of 28823 Highmeadow, Farmington, had this difficulty in talking to the Farmington Enterprise & Observer about his work at Wayne State University.

Dr. Tchen has received a \$52,715 grant to continue a study concerning the basic factors that regulate the growth of bacteria cultures and enzymes synthesized in them.

THE SUBJECT is easier to typewrite than it is to understand.

Sales Tax Tops

Hope Scholar
Connie Aldrich, daughter of Harold Aldrich of 22935 Gill Rd. in Farmington, has been named to the dean's list of Hope College for the fall semester. She is a senior at the college in Holland.

When asked about it, Dr. Tchen wasn't quite sure to which of his experiments this reporter was referring.

Here's the way he explained it: "Broadly speaking the study concerns the factors in various organisms which control their metabolic activities."

"For instance," said the patient Dr. Tchen, "we are researching how a hormone affects a particular tissue."

DR. TCHEEN has been involved in bio-chemical research for about 20 years, so it's all understandable to him. His work is serious business. And he is concerned along with his colleagues over the cutback in basic research money from the government.

He comments: "Basic research has become unpopular because people say, 'What has basic research done for me?'"

"LET ME EXPLAIN," continues Dr. Tchen. "We all recognize the regeneration of tissue. You don't cut up people to study the regeneration of tissue, so you find some lowly creature whose regenerative capacities are good - like the earth worm."

"And then people say, 'Why should my money go for the study of regeneration of worms?'"

"What people should realize," says Dr. Tchen, "is that the things we take for granted today were on the frontiers of basic research 20 years ago."

"It is true that basic researches are expensive, but they essentially form the foundation for future developments in medicine."

IN REFERENCE to his \$52,715 grant, the biochemist notes, "When you take in all the costs, it takes about \$15,000-\$20,000 per person for full time research. The grant only supports three fulltime research persons."
