And you can't tell me or anyone that if that is the interest rate, we are not going to be charged the 9%.
2. The whole point was missed completely that we were trying to make. We WANT the road improved and we are willing to PAY more than our share, but the prices that the mayor and City Council are asking from us alone and telling us this is a subdivision road is the most ridiculous statement I have ever heard!
Take a survey in subdivisions and even drivers on this road and ask them where they live and how often they use this road and then go down the trail and ask us how often we use subdivision roads.
