Irish cultural series draws renown speakers

From Tuesday through Saturday, "Irish American Spring Cultural Series" will be presented in the Library Hall of Marygrove College, 8425 West McNichols at Wyoming in northwest Detroit.

The five-day series of lectures, co-sponsored by the Metro-Detroit Chapter of the Irish American Cultural Institute and the history department of Marygrove College, will be presented at 8 p.m. each night. Admission is \$3 per night or \$10 for the series.

The series will feature national Irish authors, historians, musicians, politicians and professors discussing Irish music and dance, Irish politics in America, Irish literature, the freedom struggle in Ireland and Irish settlements. Irish music, dance and refreshments will be offered in addition to the lectures.

The five-day lecture series includes the following speakers and topics: Tuesday, Dr. Lawrence McCaffrey, historian and author from Loyola University in Chicago, will discuss "The Irish American Political Style." Wednesday, Paul O'Dwyer, New York attorney and former president of the New York City Council, will lecture on "Irish America and the Freedom Struggle in Ireland." Thursday, Dr. Joseph Browne, chairman of the graduate English department at West Chester State College in West Chester, Pa., will discuss "Irish American Writers."

On Friday, Dr. John Brendan Flannery, historian and professor at the College of St. Mary's in San Antonio, Texas, will discuss "Irish Texans: The Irish Role in Settling the Southwest United States." Saturday, Mick Moloney

of Pennsylvania State University will discuss "Irish Music in America" and will sing. Moloney, singing, will be accompanied by Eugene O'Donnell on the fiddle, also of Penn State University. The last evening will also feature a "celebration" and informal Irish jam session of dance, music and refreshments. Each night Irish books on history, music, art, dance, and politics will be sold

to accompany the lectures. Tickets can be purchased at the door at \$3 per evening or ahead of time for \$10 for the entire series by calling 535-7425 days or 533-4945, evenings. 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The basic insured amount for each depositor is \$100,000. In addition to your individual account, you have interest in other accounts in other rights or capacities, those accounts are covered, too, up to certain limits. This doesn't mean that you can have two protected accounts in the same name, but if you have a joint account with your spouse plus a joint account with a child, those jointly held funds will be protected, up to \$100,000 per person for all joint accounts in the same bank. Joint accounts may be as joint tenants with right of survivorship, as tenants in the entirety, tenants in common, or as a deposit owned by large amounts may be covered if owners and beneficiaries meet certain degrees of kinship, for both grantors and beneficiaries are covered. Special accounts, such as IRAs or pension funds, are held by the bank in a trust or custodial capacity; they are covered separately.
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
