

Rival softball coaches on friendly terms

Southfield softball coach Jerry Dolan and Southfield-Lathrup coach Don Perry are close in more ways than one. For starters, they're both sixth-grade teachers at Southfield's Levey Middle School.

"We're good friends and we have been for a long time," said Perry, whose Lathrup Chargers open their season with an 11 a.m. double-header at Birmingham Marian April 17.

"We have a friendly rivalry going. I give him tips all day and he does the same for me."

"It was lots of fun last year... till he beat me," said Dolan, whose Blue Jays start play April 19 with a 4:15 p.m. game at Ferndale.

Lathrup graduated three starters from the 1981 team, which posted a 14-9 record and finished fourth in the six-team Metro Suburban Activities Association. The hardest to replace will be pitcher Mo Monsoura.

But Perry is working with 10 seniors including several with three years experience.

Pitching prospects include senior right-handers Sheri Biller (4-3 last year) and Amy Sklar (1-0). Senior Diane Reinlein, who hit .280 last year, is set in center field, as is Lori Curcio at short stop and Carol Lawton at first base.

Junior Marianne Cinat, who started as a sophomore, will play at third.

"Probably our strength is our defense," Perry said. "Last year, we won several games when we were outthrust. That's a sign of good defense."

"Our pitching should be good, too. We don't overpower people, but we don't walk them either."

DOLAN LOST five talented seniors from last year's Southfield squad, which was 14-8 overall and 10-3 in the Southeastern Michigan Association. The Jays were second to Royal Oak Kimball.

To make things worse, two good juniors from last season, Julie Graham and Sheri Dodge, decided not to come out for softball this spring.

"So, basically, we're going to have an all-new team," said Dolan, "and I'm excited about that. It gives me a chance to work with some new people."

Southfield's No. 1 pitcher should be junior right-hander Linda Mitchell, who had a 6-1 record as a sophomore. "She's an all-around good athlete," Dolan said. Another pitching possibility is senior right-hander Paula Levine, who gained experience with the Jays last year.

Other softball prospects are senior outfielders Kelly Jones and Tammy Morgan, juniors Beth Sleep (first base) and Patti Pross (outfield) and sophomores Maria Rabara (catcher) and Laurie Silverman (second base).

Southfield can average that 1981 loss to Lathrup on April 24. The Jays travel to Lathrup for a noon twin bill on that Saturday.

Handed pitcher, tops Brown's list. "I get excited when I think about her being here for three years," the coach said.

She has speed and her ball moves around quite a bit."

Other pitching hopefuls are juniors Kristy Shreve and Andrea Cagle and sophomore Kim Burrell, all right-handers.

Freshman catcher Karen Stolzenberg is a gun for an arm and is so willing to learn," according to Brown.

Freshman Rhonda Hitchcock and junior Julie Sedor, both infielders, should see lots of action, as will junior outfielder Sandy Belcher.

"Our pitching staff is going to have

to do most of the work for us," Brown said. "If they (the pitchers) come through, we could win some games. These kids are fast enough so that people will have trouble hitting them."

Kick boxer aims for title

"If more people see it, the more will like it. The more people who come to watch it, the more money there will be. The more money there is, the better fighters there will be. And, with better fighters, there will be more public appeal," he explained.

It sounds logical. However, before the bottom line can be attained, the sport has to be made visible.

"Once you mix the two together (kick boxing implemented in boxing shows), there will be enough for both sides," Roop said. "I don't want to fight with the boxing people. I want to work with them. I'm just trying to get the sport known to the public. Once they see it, I think they'll be in for a surprise."

KICK BOXING is similar to boxing, except the fighters can use their feet as a weapon. This, Roop explains, is a dynamic dimension which gives the fighters two more courses of attack in their arsenal.

"When you put the two together (hands and feet), you can be very effective," he said. "With four weapons, you

can have one come out of nowhere to score a good point or serve as a knock-out blow."

"Kick boxing is just like boxing, the only difference is you can throw kicks with the legs. The rules are the same, and the target area is the same," Roop said. "Most of the skills are the same. Like boxing, it can be very dangerous if you don't have the proper skills. There's a lot of training and a lot of stamina involved."

Roop will begin training for his title bout April 19. His preparation will consist pretty much of the same rigors a boxer would be put through.

"It's the same as boxing," Roop said, "plus a lot of kicking drills. 'You shadow box, there's a lot of bag work, with kicking, and a lot of road work. I'll train about three hours a day, five days a week."

Roop, who has been participating as a kick boxer for five years, has a professional record of 19-7. One of his losses was to Macaruso, but it came while Roop was a rookie kick boxer.

"I fought him about 2 1/2 years ago,

and I fought on sheer heart and determination," Roop said. "I didn't have the skills I have now. When I fought him, I won the first and last (ninth) rounds, and lost the middle rounds. He beat me decisively, it wasn't close at all."

"SINCE THEN, I've learned a lot about fighting. He's still undefeated, but everybody thinks I can win. I can win, it all comes down to how hard I train. I've paid my dues, now it's my turn."

"I'm going to push hard in my training," Roop said, "because I think whoever is the most aggressive and has the most stamina will win. I won't predict a knockout, because it's going to be a tough fight."

The championship fight will be another effort by Roop to promote the sport. Since the dollars aren't there, he's not fighting for the money, but rather for the love of the sport and the hope that it may grow.

"I won't be a fighter when the money is there," he said, "but my fighters will, and I'll be there to train them."
