recommended cutting \$3.08 million from the district's \$26.06 budget. Here's a rundown of those proposed cuts adopted by a 4-2 board vote last week. Trustees Patricis Jackenna and Kenneth Tucker dissented.

Reduce elementary staff by five teachers (313,000), thus increasing class size.
