unintelligible, means of making a sim-ple statement. He illustrated this with Lionel Trill-ing's translation of the statement "They fell in love and married." Trill-ing put it this way. "Their libidinal in-pulses being reciprocal, they eached their individual crotic drawes and inte-grated them within the same frame of reference."

Trying to give a name to what 15 Republican senators were doing in voting against a state income tax increase and effecting a decrease in social services is not as important as exposing it for what it is.

Transferring the burden of state programs from the middle and upper income classes to the lower income prop is unjust and blatant political expediency.

Unfortunately be has another problem and is more upset about it than he is the pueumonia. His is unable to hold his orine, and as well as being embedding the problem will continue when he returns home. Can something be done about this?

Loss of bladder control in hospital-ized older people is very common. With the insult of an acute disease such as your father's pneumonia and the change of bladder function routine that is enforced by bet rest, it is almost cer-tain that some incontinence (bed wett-ing) will be expresenced. ing) will be experienced.

Your father should not be discouraged, as such problems are usually remedied when the person returns home to his/her routine.

I can understand your concern for your own mental health in this matter so I would sugest that you ask your family doctor to refer you to the near-est genetic center. Genetic centers are located in teaching hospitals that are associated with medical schools.
