What Makes Junior High School Students Tick?

FARMINGTON What makes junior high school students tick? What are realistic guidelines for an educational program based on their individual rates of growth and development?

These two basic questions are under consideration this year by a cross section committee composed of students, parents and educators. Their findings may result in curriculum changes that will add relevance to the district program.

Following the workshop, each school will submit its faculty reactions to the proposed guidelines. Theory will have undergone the white light of practicality.

"Ideally," explained Joseph Nicita director of secondary education, "schools should teach each student individually, but is this possible in practice?" The junior high staffs will be able to give us insights on the practicality of our theories.

Proposals resulting from the final report will be presented to the Board of Education for their consideration in future planning of curriculum.

With such facts in mind, it is possible that even more efforts at individualizing the educational process are in order.

At study sessions to date, the total group has divided into major segments of eight to 10. A "white paper" on concepts relating to junior high educational procedures which has been studied by members prior to the meeting provides a springboard for "nitty gritty" discussion.

Reports are written by a recorder at each of these sessions and each member is invited to write personal statements as well.

ALL OF THESE will be coordinated into a list of educational guidelines which in turn will be refined once again by the committee before the proposed guidelines workshop to be held March 24. At that time, all junior high staffs will have an opportunity to assess the report.

Teacher Is Speaker At Workshops
Richard Holmes, an associate professor at Oakland Community College, spoke at two workshops which were part of a six-state regional institute on Effective Engineering Teaching recently in Milwaukee.

Co-sponsored by the American Society for Engineering Education, the College of Applied Science and Engineering, University of Wisconsin at Milwaukee, and the University of Wisconsin Extension Division, the institute was attended by representatives from Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, North Dakota and South Dakota.

Holmes, who is associate professor and chairman of the OCC Highland Lakes Campus Applied Science Department, discussed "Objective Writing for the Inexperienced" and conducted a seminar dealing with current projects at the institute.

The two-day program was initiated by the Educational Research and Methods Division of the American Society for Engineering Education and was one of a series of regional institutes to be given throughout the country during 1970.
