

Curfew Ends For Coeds

University of Michigan Regents have abolished the requirement that certain women living in residence halls observe a curfew.

The Regents acted on the recommendation of the student-faculty-administration Residence Halls Board of Governors and Dr. Barbara Newell, acting vice president for student affairs, during the March 19 meeting.

March 19 meeting.

The evening curiew had been lifted in 1962 for women over 21 and experimentally in 1968 for those under 21 who had their parents' permission.

All men in residence halls had such privileges already.

THURSDAY'S action ex-tends the privilege to all wom-en, regardless of age. In a letter to the Regents, the Board of Governors said:

the Board of Governors said:
"Women's hours no longer serve a legitimate function in our educational community. If women's hours serve any role it is their apparent responsiveness to parental anxieties. For the women themselves buildings are secured at midnight and a voluntary sign-out procedure is in effect whereby investigations are initiated if a female resident does not return at the time she designates.

anxieties is a concern the Board of Governors accepts as legitimate for students under 21 years of age. The board has serious concern, however, that parents not be given false or unrealistic expectations about what the University can do to protect their daughters.

"Women's hours in the con-"Women's hours in the con-text of present-day concepts of privacy and non-intrusion generate serious false expecta-tions. As the Board of Regents knows, the women's hours pol-icy is easily circumvented by a girl's merely not signing out.

girl to spend the night in an apartment to avoid being found in violation of women's bours."

VICE PRESIDENT Newell, in her recommendation to the Regents, noted that the curfew "is in marked contrast to the increasing freedoms revivided. "is in marked contrast lofthe ipcreasing freedoms provided to students both in their aca-demic and nonacademic devel-opment. These restrictions become increasingly more dif-ficult to administer due to the lack of any significant support within the University com-munity."
